From our spiritual director, Father Sam

In September's article, I decided to take a look into the soul's journey to union with God as guided by the wisdom of the saints. To briefly review, there are 3 classic stages through which a soul passes to achieve total fulfillment in God. In the previous article, I offered a few points on the first stage called the purgative way. In this stage, the person begins the journey by a firm renunciation of all sin and makes the effort to detach from worldly pursuits and pleasures. This stage is characterized by an initial feeling of consolation as the soul actively undertakes the journey through the practices of attending Mass often, humbly going to the Sacrament of Confession, daily prayer, and penances. Along with the active phase in the purgative stage, there is also a passive phase in which God works in secret, "behind-thescenes" as it were, on purifying the soul's attachments. This is often done through feelings of desolation. If a person, who is consistently practicing the Faith, including the frequent reception of the Sacraments, daily prayer, penances, and avoidance of all sin, has the feeling of emptiness, dryness, lack of peace and absence of joy (spiritual darkness), then this is a strong indication God is now working on the soul in the passive phase of the 1st stage. It is important that at this point of the journey the person does not abandon the practices although they are not feeling the same consolations as they did when they first began. Many people give up when the road becomes narrow, rough, and dark. If they persevere in prayer as our Lord Jesus encouraged in a recent Gospel (Luke 18 8:1-8), then they will reach the next stage referred to as the illuminative way. In this stage, the soul makes progress in the journey by avoiding any and all mortal sins and having greater success in detaching from worldly things. The stage is called the illuminative way because at this point the person's mind and heart become more and more enlightened with the practice of virtue, the 4 Cardinal Virtues, which are prudence, temperance, justice, and fortitude, and the Theological Virtues, which are faith, hope, and charity. There is also a greater desire for total union with Christ. In the illuminative way, charitable acts begin to increase within the person's life as they look beyond oneself to the other in service. The prayer that is most often associated with this stage is meditation (see: Catechism of the Catholic Church #2705). The practice of prayer includes meditating on the mysteries of the rosary, attending silent retreats, and spending time in Lectio Divina/ reading scriptures, etc. There should be a greater desire for silence in prayer and a greater attentive-


ness to personal integrity of word and action and the intentions of acts performed. It is not uncommon that this stage lasts for many years after one passes from the purgative stage. Quite often there is a series of great desolations and consolations. St. John of the Cross says that during this stage a person can occupy their mind with God with much greater ease and joy than in the later part of the purgative way. Nevertheless, there are still purifications to encounter in this stage, though usually with occasional dryness, boredom, trials, and darkness in prayer (see: CCC#2729). Many times during this stage one experiences external suffering (persecution from others, detraction, loss), which God permits and which fortifies one's faith. The person should slowly persevere through them with constancy in prayer.¹ Even when we don't feel like praying, or especially when we don't feel like praying, this is the time to really pray from our hearts. Like the penitent tax collector who "stood off at a distance and would not even raise his eyes to heaven but beat his breast and prayed," we cry out in all humility "O God, be merciful to me a sinner" (Luke 18:9-14). We continually to beg God for the only thing that really matters for our happiness and that is total union with Him.

Let us also ask for the support of the Virgin Mary, our mother, as we continue on our journey to union with God. May the Good Lord pour out His blessings on you and your family.
